Meet Lauren

Lauren first came to ICH as a student in the Family Intervention Service (FIS) and then worked in OHC as a youth worker whilst finishing her degree. Once graduated, she interviewed for a case worker role, and has since has been tasked with managing events within our programme. We asked Lauren a few questions so that our carers could get to know her a little better.

What do you wish people knew about your role? The team at OHC are always looking at ways to improve our service through updating policies, designating roles within the team, etc. We are a great team and together strive to make sure all carers and children feel supported, seen, and heard.

What helps you get through the tough days? A little bit of chocolate, a walk with my 8-month-old Cavoodle named Sadie, or a movie night with my partner.

What is something interesting about yourself? This year I have opened a Physical Culture club in Capalaba where I teach dance to girls and women from the ages of 2.5 years old to 50+ years old! I have been doing Physie for 22 years and teaching for a total of 9 years most of which were back down in Western Sydney. Physie is dance sport that combines elements of multiple dance genres, aerobics, yoga, and Pilates. These are put into routines and performed to popular music, and is a great way to exercise while having a ball!



NAIDOC Week Celebrations

This month, we had an opportunity to attend several NAIDOC events. For those that aren't aware, NAIDOC stands for National Aboriginal and Islander Day Observance Committee and is a time to highlight and celebrate the history, culture, and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders in our community.

We took the opportunity to learn about Aboriginal art and partake in some of the local events with our Indigenous leaders with the aim of building further cultural connections and awareness.

As an agency this is especially important for us because we have challenged ourselves to build our capacity and competence in this space - and have a mechanism to keep ourselves accountable in this context. As we know, many foster and kinship carers can be caring for an Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander child at some point, and we're aiming to have these connections transfer to better cultural competence in our practice which we hope will impact our carers and children in a very positive way.



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Partners In Care: 18th of July 2023



Earlier this month we had our PIC meeting. Carers expressed their appreciation for the support that they've received and were thankful for the carer and school holiday events that have been happening within OHC. As partners, we were able to share some of the challenges faced within the geographical catchment that we are all in including logistical challenges with school drop-offs and family time (or family contact). It was explained that the foster care system is complex and dynamic with many variables that impact the way a region is zoned. We will continue to provide feedback and support carers within this context. Thank you for sharing.

Finally, carers expressed that it can be challenging to end placement and it's important for both carer and child that we consider how the transition from one placement to another occurs. We are cognizant of this and will continue to advocate for a smooth transition and where possible will ensure that this occurs.

One of the big takeaways from this meeting is that every carer is able to articulate an emotional connection to providing care that perhaps can't be understood unless you've done it yourself. I really appreciated this learning.

There are actions that have derived from this meeting and we will share some of the things we will work on moving forward. Thank you so much to all that attended and we're looking forward to more of you attending when you can. The next has been scheduled for October 10th at 10am at our office!
